What was it like to live through the plague?

History Vocabulary

- The Great Plague occurred between <u>1665 and 1666</u>.
- Some doctors believed that bad poisonous air was the cause of the plague, infecting anyone who breathed it.
- The most common symptoms included headaches, fever, vomiting, painful swellings on the neck, armpits and groin (known as buboes), blisters and bruises and coughing up blood.
- There was still no cure for the plague people just had to try and stop it from spreading.
- People suffering or showing symptoms of the plague were simply banished to their homes.
- A large red cross was nailed to the front door to warn others that those inside were infected. 'God have mercy upon
- The real root of the problem was black RATS!
- Fleas would bite the rats and become infected and the infected fleas would then spread the disease to humans.
